National Influenza Vaccination Week Is Observed December 2 - 6

National Influenza Vaccination Week (NIVW) serves as an important reminder for everyone ages 6 months and older that it's not too late to protect themselves and their loved ones from the flu this season by getting their annual flu vaccine, if they haven't already. CDC data shows that flu vaccination coverage was lower last season, especially among certain higher risk groups, including children. When you get a flu vaccine, you reduce your risk of illness, and flu-related hospitalization if you do get sick. This week is meant to remind people that there is still time to benefit from the first and most important action in preventing flu illness and potentially serious flu complications: get a flu vaccine today. Enhancing Substance Use Disorder Treatment and Opioid Overdose Response: WHA **Surveys for Member Feedback**

WHA is committed to improving access to treatment for substance use disorders and mitigating the risk of opioid overdose. We offer two key programs to support these efforts: the Wisconsin Rural Health and Substance Use Clinical Support (RHeSUS) Program and the ED Opioid Response Protocol (ORP). These programs provide vital resources, including program management, training, education, and technical assistance.

To better understand your needs and experiences in these critical areas, we kindly request that you or a designated colleague/staff member complete the following surveys.

The first is a brief Naloxone Distribution Survey, focused on the distribution of Naloxone in Emergency Departments. Your input will help us assess the current distribution practices and determine areas for improvement. Please take a moment to complete the survey. If you're not the right person to respond, kindly forward it to someone who can, such as the ED CMO or ED Manager.

The second survey is the Hospital Peer Support Utilization Survey. This anonymous survey seeks feedback on staff experiences with and perspectives on peer recovery support services for treating patients with substance use disorders or addiction. It is expected to take 5-7 minutes to complete. The survey is ideal for clinicians who work in Emergency Departments, urgent care centers, primary care settings, and other locations where peer recovery services are provided. We encourage you to share this survey across various disciplines, including Hospital Administration, MD/DO, PA/NP, Pharmacists, Psychologists, RNs, Behavioral Health Providers, Peer Support Providers, and others.

Thank you in advance for your participation and support in disseminating these important surveys. Your feedback is invaluable in shaping the future of substance use disorder treatment and overdose response programs across the state.

Patient Safety Structural Measure

As part of the FY2025 rule, CMS is requiring hospitals participating in the Hospital Inpatient Quality Reporting (IQR) program to implement the Patient Safety Structural Measure (PSSM). Hospitals will need to comply with the measure beginning January 1, 2025.

The PSSM is an attestation-based measure developed to assess whether the hospital's systems and strategies prioritize and facilitate a culture of safety. The PSSM consists of five domains.

- Domain 1: Leadership Commitment to Eliminating Preventable Harm
- Domain 2: Strategic Planning and Organizational Policy Domain 3: Culture of Safety and Learning Health System
- Domain 4: Accountability and Transparency
- Domain 5: Patient and Family Engagement

The Quick Start Guide: Patient Safety Structural Measure gives an explanation of each of the PSSM domains and elements for attestation. The Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI) webinar Transforming Safety with the CMS PSSM & National Action Plan provides an overview of PSSM.

Hospitals must evaluate and attest to each of the elements within domains. Each domain is worth one point, for a total of five (5) points. The hospital must meet the required number of elements within a domain to receive a point. CMS will not give partial credit within the domain. The PSSM attestation will be reported via the National Healthcare Safety Network (NHSN) platform with specific system reporting details released later by NHSN. Hospitals choosing not to participate in the IQR program or meet elements of the domains may face a significant reduction in their annual Medicare payment update. CMS IQR Measures are available via CMS QualityNet.

Improving Patient Safety by Reducing Communication Failures- An Introduction to I-PASS

I-PASS is a standardized handoff tool used in healthcare to ensure clear and consistent communication during patient transitions between clinicians. It stands for Introduction, Patient, Assessment, Situation, and Safety concerns. By organizing key information in a structured way, IPASS helps prevent errors, reduces misunderstandings, and promotes patient safety, ensuring that critical details about a patient's condition and care plan are accurately conveyed. This leads to improved continuity of care and minimized risks during shifts or transfers. I-PASS has been proven to reduce patient harm by up to 70%, and the return on investment (ROI) can be realized by mitigating even one adverse patient event. NHSN Patient Safety Component Users: 2022 HAI Rebaseline Webinars

The National Healthcare Safety Network (NHSN) Rebaseline Team has announced new training opportunities for the 2022 Rebaseline. Join on December 18 and 19 for insightful webinars where the NHSN Team will present the new 2022 baseline risk adjustment models for SSI Complex 30-day (COLO and HYST) and MRSA bacteremia LabID; the webinars will discuss the methods, covariates used to calculate the Standardized Infection Ratio (SIR) using the new 2022 baseline, how to run and interpret the new SIR reports in NHSN, and highlight additional training resources. These webinars are designed to deepen your understanding of the 2022 national baseline, helping NHSN users effectively apply the updated SSI and MRSA bacteremia SIRs to HAI surveillance and prevention work in their facilities and jurisdictions.

We encourage Patient Safety Component Facility and Group users who analyze SSI and MRSA bacteremia LabID SIR data to join these webinars or view the recordings. The webinars will be recorded and posted on the NHSN Rebaseline website, in the Education & Training tab.
